

Proclamation In Recognition of the

25th Cherry Blossom Heritage Festival

WHEREAS, the sakura, or cherry blossom, is a symbol of good fortune, love and affection, or hope; and

WHEREAS, cherry blossom trees first came to Waimea in 1953 as a living memorial to Fred Makino, founder of Hawai'i's Japanese language newspaper, Hawaii Hochi; and

WHEREAS, cherry blossom trees are planted and propagated to beautify the community and recognize its strong ties to Japan; and

WHEREAS, in 1975, Lions Club members planted numerous trees throughout Waimea to commemorate the visit of Emperor Hirohito and his wife and to honor the first Japanese immigrants who settled in Waimea; and

WHEREAS, the Cherry Blossom Heritage Festival first began in 1994 under the direction of former County Parks and Recreation Director George Yoshida; and

WHEREAS, the festival showcases the Japanese tradition of hanami – "cherry blossom viewing party" – which celebrates the fleeting beauty of nature while heralding the arrival of spring; and

WHEREAS, this festival brings diversity, attracting both visitors and residents, and fosters community, business and government participation;

THEREFORE I, DAVID Y. IGE, Governor, and I, SHAN S. TSUTSUI, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, do hereby proclaim February 3, 2018 as

"Cherry Blossom Heritage Festival Day"

in Hawai'i and encourage the people of the Aloha State to join us in celebrating Waimea's premier festival and enjoy the multi-cultural performing arts, cooking demonstrations, origami, bonsai, traditional tea ceremony, mochi pounding and craft fair.
