Director of Health, State of Hawaii

- The Director of Health is the chief health and environmental official in Hawai'i and oversees more than 100 programs and over 2,700 dedicated staff whose mission it is to protect and improve the health and environment for all people in Hawai'i.
- In addition to general administrative and oversight responsibilities, Dr. Anderson provides direction as appropriate to the Office of Public Health Preparedness, Family Health, Disease Outbreak Control, Emergency Medical Services, Communicable Diseases, Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, Developmental Disabilities, Environmental Health, State Laboratories, Behavioral Health, Hawaii State Hospital, Alcohol and Drug Abuse, and other programs within the Department. He also provides administrative support to attached agencies including the State Health Planning and Development Agency, Office of Language Access, State Council on Developmental Disabilities, Disability and Communication Access Board, Executive Office on Aging, and the Office of Environmental Quality Control.

- The Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) is responsible for the management of Hawaii's aquatic resources and ecosystems through programs to protect and restore the aquatic environment, endangered species, combat the introduction of invasive species, effectively manage fisheries; and carry out education and outreach to the public. The DAR Administrator provides direction and supervision to over 100 marine biologists and other professional staff located on all the major Hawaiian Islands.
- In addition to the responsibilities above, Dr. Anderson lead the State's "30 x 30 Initiative" (to effectively manage 30 percent of Hawaii's nearshore waters by 2030) and the development of the State's Coral Reef Bleaching Recovery Plan. These plans are currently being implemented.
- DAR promulgated numerous new rules to better manage fisheries throughout the state, including the Kaupulehu Fisheries Management Area and the first Community-based Subsistence Fishing Area in Haena, Kauai under Dr. Anderson's leadership.
- As DAR administrator, Dr. Anderson also served on the Papahanaumokuakea Management Board, which is responsible for managing the Northwest Hawaiian Islands, and served as the Department of Land and Natural Resource representative on the Western Pacific Fisheries Management Council.
