

Proclamation

WHEREAS, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is a chronic systemic disease that includes emphysema, chronic bronchitis and chronic asthma; and

WHEREAS, COPD causes long-term disability and more than 15 million adults are diagnosed with COPD; and

WHEREAS, COPD kills more than 120,000 Americans every year and the death rate has increased 163 percent since 1965; and

WHEREAS, in Hawai'i, there are over 45,000 adults diagnosed with COPD and many people go undiagnosed; and

WHEREAS, smoking and secondhand smoke remain major causes of COPD, and it is estimated that one in six COPD patients never smoked; and

WHEREAS, Alpha-1 Antitrypsin Deficiency (Alpha-1) is a genetic form of COPD that affects about 4 percent of those who have COPD but is underdiagnosed and undertreated; and

WHEREAS, in May 2017, the U.S. government released the first National COPD Action Plan, noting the huge health burden that COPD imposes on people; and

WHEREAS, the National Heart Lung Blood Institute began a "Learn More, Breathe Better" COPD awareness campaign to strengthen prevention efforts and improve diagnosis and treatment; and

WHEREAS, the Hawai'i COPD Coalition collaborates with many organizations to increase awareness of COPD by offering resources and providing information about lung health, free monthly support group meetings and an annual free education day; and

WHEREAS, November 20, 2019 is designated as World COPD Day and orange is the national color of COPD;

THEREFORE I, DAVID Y. IGE, Governor, and I, JOSHUA B. GREEN, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, do hereby proclaim November 2019 as

"COPD AND ALPHA-1 AWARENESS MONTH"

in Hawai'i and ask the people of the Aloha State to learn more about COPD and encourage those at risk to get tested and seek treatment.
